Don't let that put you off though because there's so much rich, luscious, mouthfilling fruit flavour here that it's quite difficult to believe that this is a sub \$25 red. Parker commenting on the talented young winemaker "he appears to have a talent for turning out magnificently concentrated, full throttle reds that are indigenous to the top echelon of Southern Australian producers" and "an up and coming superstar estate that merits considerable attention".

The name Pirathon is an ancient term meaning Pinnacle, and the aim of winemaker Troy Kalleske wine is to showcase Barossa's pinnacle Shiraz sub districts located in North Western Barossa - Greenock, Moppa, Belvedere, Stonewell, Seppeltsfield, Koonunga and Ebenezer. Each sub districts terrior contributing it's own dimension to the final wine. The parcels of fruit are kept separate during the winemaking process with maturation in a combination of new and seasoned American, French, Russian and Hungarian oak hogsheads for 24 months. The wine is then bottled without fining or filtration.

Outstanding black crimson purple colour, totally opaque with good cling to the wall. Perfumed top note blackberry, liquorice, confectionary and violets, showing strong varietal character. The structure is more refined than that of the '05 vintage. Flavours of vanilla, black pepper and blackberry are supported by fine dryish tannins over a mocha background. Aftertaste of vanilla and black pepper. Cellar 4-5 years (2012-2013)

The august Barons of the Barossa ordained Troy Kalleske as 2008 Winemaker of the Year. The Kalleske's are latter-day biodynamic and organic pioneers. Lutheran Pastors have tended to regard followers of Rudolph Steiner, the bio-D guru, as the anti-Christ, which is a bit silly. The Barossa used only the old natural spray remedies and composts til the uber-chemo epoch marched in with gardening by remote. Smelling of the scones and cream at an old railway station kiosk as much as your actual blackberries, this is delightful, clean, wholesome, healthy, hand-made black-as-sin shiraz from Kalleske's friends' vineyards.

Fabulous smelling wine packed with dark Barossan goodness and offering things like black fruit, dark chocolate, baking spices (nutmeg, cloves, all-spice), roses, tar and a little menthol lift. The oak is unobtrusive and beautifully folded into the wine. On the palate full bodied with rich black fruit, a little raspberry, dark chocolate and spicy flavours. It's smooth, ripe and long and enormously satisfying to drink. I think it's probably even better than the 2005...so perhaps I should score it higher.

Regardless, I'd recommend getting onto and into a bit of this gear without reservation.
